15. Alternative Assessments - All students in WI are included in WI's accountability system, including students with significant cognitive disabilities. 17. How to Advocate for Resources in the Next State Budget? - Planning for the next State budget has begun. This session will focus on work of the Council on Children's Long-Term Support and the Survival Coalition which has been advocating for additional resources to meet the needs of children in WI. 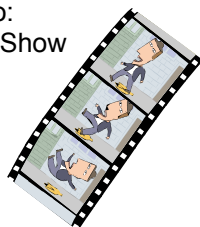
